# Introduction

The Rothschild Foundation, rooted in over 70 years of family leadership, is dedicated to making long-term impactful contributions to the arts, local communities, and the environment, with Waddesdon Manor as the emblem of our mission. The Annual Review of the Rothschild Foundation's investment in Waddesdon Manor can be found at https://waddesdon.org.uk/

This review covers grants awarded between March 2024 and February 2025 in Buckinghamshire and wider England.

The Rothschild Foundation's programme of grant-giving is guided by our ambition to raise standards, create opportunities and effect positive change. This is reflected through our support of local charities, our commitment to the arts and our solution-driven exploration of environmental challenges.

Over the past year we have stepped up our support of the arts, recognising the significant financial challenges experienced by the sector. Locally, this includes investing in sector support organisation, Bucks Culture, whilst continuing to provide vital multi-year, flexible core funding to our local arts organisations.

Our philanthropy is driven by the conviction that, to make a real difference, it must play an active part in shaping the future. With our national arts funding, this is seen in support of a new Art and Tech Hub at Somerset House and our collaboration with the Art Fund to address the lack of diversity in curatorial leadership.

In relation to the environment, where climate change poses the future at significant risk, we continue to interrogate where our philanthropy can add value. Building on the Rothschild legacy of nature restoration, our exploration of how best to support the transition to nature-friendly farming practice has been a key focus over the past year. With partners such as the Royal Agricultural University and the University of Leeds, we are supporting the development of skills and knowledge in this area, including our own.

One of our central aims is to invest in the next generation. This shines through in our support of the Screen Academy Foundation, where we have expanded funding to include East London Arts and Music while continuing the relationship with London Screen Academy.

To demonstrate our dedication to making a difference, we awarded a number of exceptional grants at the end of year, beyond our usual yearly budgetary allocation. These grants marked the next generation of Rothschild family leadership at the Foundation.

# Sir Roger Wright



Sir Roger Wright was appointed as Chief Executive Officer of the Rothschild Foundation in October 2024, following an extensive international search.

Sir Roger was previously Chief Executive of Britten Pears Arts ("BPA"), a music, visual arts and heritage charity based in Suffolk, from 2014 until he stepped down in July 2024. During his decade at BPA he oversaw significant transformation of the organisation, including acquisition of the Snape Maltings site and the development of its creative campus, and the merging with Britten Pears Foundation to create Britten Pears Arts. His steering of the organisation through the Covid-19 pandemic was critically acclaimed and for which he received a special award from the Association of British Orchestras.

Prior to his role at BPA, Sir Roger was the award-winning Controller of BBC Radio 3 from 1998 to 2014, and Director of BBC Proms from 2007 to 2014. He is widely regarded as one of the UK's most experienced cultural leaders.

Dame Hannah Rothschild, Chair of the Rothschild Foundation, commented: "Sir Roger brings immense gravitas, inspiration and experience to the Rothschild Foundation. The Trustees have been overwhelmingly impressed by his deep-rooted love of the arts, his commitment to charitable causes, his management prowess and his track record of inspiring and transformational leadership. Sir Roger will help shape and realise the organisation's ambitious new targets and projects."

Sir Roger Wright, incoming Chief Executive of the Rothschild Foundation, added: "I am honoured and hugely excited to have been appointed as Chief Executive of the Rothschild Foundation. This is a significant time in the Foundation's history as it furthers its mission to deliver positive change and meaningful impact for the benefit of future generations. I look forward to working with Dame Hannah, the Trustees, staff and volunteers to continue the Foundation's remarkable philanthropic purpose."

# End of Year Grants

These exceptional grants awarded at the end of 2024 and the beginning of 2025 marked the start of the next generation of family leadership at the Rothschild Foundation, led by our Chair, Dame Hannah Rothschild DBE. Grants align to our core aims of supporting arts and heritage, and the environment, and to enabling innovation and excellence.

#### ASHMOLEAN MUSEUM (THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD)

Core funding for the Ashmolean Museum's exhibition, learning and public engagement programmes.

#### **ASPIRE FOR YOUNG PEOPLE**

Capital funding to support development of the Shortenills outdoor learning site which is run by Aspire Alternative Provision for children with social, emotional and mental health needs.

#### THE AUCKLAND PROJECT

Core support to the Auckland Project's development of museums, galleries, and open parkland which enliven the local community and economy.

It is a cornerstone of the Royal Drawing School's digital transformation which also includes a new website, home to online courses, exhibitions and a digital studio.

In recent years, our connection with the Royal Drawing School has been strengthened through Founder Catherine Goodman's exhibition at Waddesdon. The school's supporters and students have participated in drawing sessions in the Manor and its formal gardens. The School currently teaches 2,400 people a year, both in-person and online, connecting with students in 25 countries. All courses are supported by scholarships and bursaries, ensuring high-quality tuition in drawing remains financially accessible.

Scripts and filming for Stepping Forward were developed with guidance from a focus group of young people in care and presented by Tring Park School alumni and notable performers with experience of care. Already 13 local authorities are offering the course with more expected to come on board.



# Environment

The Rothschild Foundation has funded significant nature restoration programmes at Waddesdon and the family's environmental legacy includes founding the Society for the Promotion of Nature Reserves which became the Wildlife Trusts. Our exploration of food and farming in England builds on these achievements, to support nature restoration through soil health, habitat creation, water improvement and diverse farming techniques across national landscapes.

Over the past year we have refined our focus into two interconnected strands: enabling knowledge exchange and education for farmers; accelerating innovation through pilots and research. Alongside, we are working with a group of peers to build a funder network to increase investment in food and farming.

Locally, our work in Buckinghamshire plays a key role, testing practical activity with farmers and growers to deliver the benefits of nature-friendly farming, fresh food and shorter supply chains for our communities.

# Grants Awarded National

#### NORTH EAST COTSWOLD FARMER CLUSTER CIC

Funding a regional farmer cluster to deliver naturefriendly farming at a landscape scale, to increase biodiversity and introduce natural flood management.

# Buckinghamshire

#### **GROW TO GIVE**

Grow to Give brings together community groups and growers, enabling fresh surplus produce to get into the hands of people from low-income households. Through weekly collections in spring, summer and autumn, Grow to Give coordinates supply from local allotments. This network is due to grow from 18 to 26 allotments over the course of the Rothschild Foundation's support.

Fresh fruit and vegetables are packed into parcels for donation or cooked and consumed by community groups or charities. Grow to Give has developed recipe cards and online videos, offering guidance on trying and cooking new and seasonal produce. The charity has responded to requests from the community, for example growing and supplying more beetroot to a support group for Ukrainians newly settled in Bucks.





Grow to Give sums up their impact: 'zero food miles, ecologically grown food, increased nutrition for vulnerable groups, grown with love and shared with dignity.'

#### OAKLEY VILLAGE STORES LIMITED

Capital investment in Oakley Village Stores to support its sustainability ambitions and value as a community hub providing access to local food.

#### WILDLIFE TRUST (BERKS, BUCKS AND OXON)

Employment of a Farmer Cluster Networks Officer to build on local farm coordination, delivery of knowledge exchange workshops and distribution of a budget to trial and develop a shared approach to nature recovery.



## Environmental (Other)

Funding has continued the Rothschild family legacy of environmental conservation both at Waddesdon and further afield through the support of the following.

#### CONSERVATION COLLECTIVE

Core funding for the Ionian Environmental Foundation which works in the Ionian Islands in Greece.

#### WADDESDON AVIARY

The Rothschild Foundation supports the Aviary at Waddesdon Manor, including maintaining its status as a zoo through the provision of grants to partner conservation organisations.

This year, grants were awarded to the Zoological Society London to support the expert based searches for the Tooth-billed Pigeon, as well as to the Center for Biodiversity and Conservation Universitas in Indonesia to support the critically endangered Banggai crow.

#### WADDESDON SUSTAINABILITY HUB

The Rothschild Foundation has worked closely on projects with Waddesdon Manor this year that included the development of a conservation and sustainability hub at the unused woodland café at Waddesdon Manor.



# Community



Guided by the motto of the Rothschild Family - integrity, harmony, and hard work, our funding recognises these qualities in the organisations we support.

Nationally, this means proactively identifying organisations, each dedicated to meeting the needs of the communities they serve.

Locally, we operate a Community Fund which supports organisations serving communities experiencing disadvantage and inequality in Buckinghamshire with multi-year and flexible funding. Whilst the fund responds to a broad range of needs there is a particular focus on homelessness, financial hardship, mental health and physical and learning disabilities. During this year, we provided funding to 33 organisations in the county.

The Caribbean Community Lunch Club is a thriving group offering a hot meal and regular social interaction at an accessible community centre in Aylesbury. It's a lively place where card games and dominoes are played alongside physical activity sessions to keep members agile in their later years. The club runs advice sessions, for example getting guidance on tackling the cost-of-living from Citizens Advice Bucks. They have partnered with Bucks Council to ensure everyone coming to the club can have their blood pressure taken each week with follow-up GP referrals when needed.

# Community (Other)

#### WADDESDON MANOR

Based in Waddesdon's Learning Team, an Engagement Post will manage an education programme in partnership with Waddesdon School.



#### SCHOOLS ACCESS FUND

In Buckinghamshire we also have a focus on supporting our schools community, delivering a Schools Access Fund with the Learning Team at Waddesdon Manor. The Fund offers grants to cover the costs of school trips to the manor and gardens. Grants of up to £1,000 are available for transport and staff costs, workshop fees and National Trust Education Group Access Pass and are prioritised for schools with pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds. In 2024/25 the Schools Access fund supported 36 Buckinghamshire Schools.to visit Waddesdon.

'We would not have been able to take our children to Waddesdon manor without the funding due to our school having such a high pupil premium percentage, the parents often do not have the money.'



#### WORKING WITH WADDESDON

'Many families are not National Trust members and could not afford to visit. It added to the children's cultural capital and a whole day outdoors was a benefit to all their mental health.'

# Dialogues

As well as funding, we look for ways for the Foundation's wider assets to support our charitable objectives. This includes using the inspirational spaces we have on the Waddesdon Estate to convene around the topics of interest, stimulating discussion and debate which can lead to collective action.

This year many of our convenings focused on the future of food.

#### Tackling childhood obesity with Bite Back

This year, over a 100 students from local schools, who participated in the Bite Back Bucks School Food Partnership programme attended an event at the Dairy, Waddesdon to celebrate their progress in healthy eating projects, led by School Food Champions.

Students presented their campaigns for healthier options and reflected on discussions held with contractors, pupils and headteachers.

Later in the month, Bite Back hosted a Business Accelerator at Waddesdon. They brought together twelve businesses from across the UK's leading food retailers, manufacturers to progress a healthier offer for consumers.

#### Philanthropy in regenerative farming with the Environmental Funders Network (EFN)

In June, we came together with EFN to host an event for funders at Waddesdon to explore how philanthropy can support farming for regenerative outcomes in the UK.

The event was overwhelmingly positive. Funders said they want to collaborate, to share learning and establish a strategic funding network to accelerate regenerative food and farming at scale. Several organisations are now discussing the potential to work together.

Chair of the Rothschild Foundation, Dame Hannah Rothschild, introduced the afternoon's talks, highlighting the importance of collaboration and the power of collective effort.

The following convenings were also supported with grant funding:

#### PASTURE-FED LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION

In collaboration with Pasture for Life an event was funded to launch the report for the Food Ecolabel Review where key findings and implications were discussed to highlight the importance of the role of nature friendly farming in future food, socioenvironmental, and finance policies, regulations and voluntary initiatives.



#### FRESHWATER HABITATS TRUST

Freshwater Water Habitats Trust held a Staff Away Day in July 2024 providing an opportunity to focus on the implementation of the Freshwater Network Strategy and their priorities for the forthcoming financial year. Staff development and training through site visits at Waddesdon were also arranged.

## **Staff and Volunteer Initiatives**

#### CHARITY OF THE YEAR

As voted by staff and volunteers, the 2024 Waddesdon Charity of the Year was Aylesbury Women's Aid.

#### AYLESBURY WOMEN'S AID

Funding to support women, children and young people in Buckinghamshire who are, or have been, affected by domestic abuse

Aylesbury Women's Aid (AWA) is a registered charity working in the Aylesbury Vale District of Buckinghamshire and has been working with and on behalf of women and children since 1986, who are or have lived with domestic violence. Their purpose is 'To exist for the benefit of all women and their children who are or have experienced physical, mental, emotional, financial or sexual abuse in their relationships and to offer support, information, advice, access to temporary safe accommodation and aftercare'.

They offer a range of services from a purpose-built refuge rented from a housing association as well as a smaller owned property with the capacity to hold 14 families/single women. AWA also offers outreach, Independent Domestic Violence Advocate (IDVA) and counselling services from an office in Aylesbury Town Centre that clients can visit. This also includes the Freedom Programme, helping women who experienced domestic violence make sense of and understand what has happened to them, as well a range of support services for children and young people, who have been affected by domestic violence.

AWA work from a feminist perspective and are committed to the principle of self-help, encouraging women to determine their own futures, making information available in an accessible way,



#### STAFF SPONSORSHIP AND NOMINATIONS

Staff and volunteers at Waddesdon and the Rothschild Foundation can apply for a donation of up to £500 in support of a chosen charity. Over the year, 21 staff sponsorship grants were made to organisations with challenges including a 3 hour Spinathon for Aylesbury Women's Aid, half marathons for DENS and Scleroderma and Raynaud's UK, the Great North Run for WECare Worldwide, 5k Races for Life for Cancer Research UK, 100km and 400km cycle challenges for Givingworks and Ordinary2Extraordinary, and a triathlon for the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. There were also a number of sponsored walks for The Pace Centre and Prostate Cancer UK and swimming challenges for the Conservation Collection.



# Equality, Diversity & Inclusion

#### ACCESS SUPPORT FUND

In 2024 the Rothschild Foundation created the Access Support Fund to enable the Foundation's resources to be accessible.

Access Support Fund grants are available for people with literacy, language, vision or other needs and that need support using our grants portal, writing applications and understanding the reporting guidance.

The fund may be used to pay for a support worker, scribe, translator, sign-language interpreter or other support service as required.

# THE WADDESDON PATHWAY PROGRAMME

The Pathway programme offers fully paid (National Living Wage) internship opportunities for those interested in exploring a career in the heritage and conservation sectors. The internships provide a year long programme of training and development as well as living accommodation on site at Waddesdon.

During the year, seven internships were funded within departments such as Conservation, Sustainability, Hospitality and Marketing.

#### WADDESDON MANOR COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PROGRAMME

The Foundation supports a community engagement programme at Waddesdon which aims to reach and engage priority audiences from communities in Buckinghamshire who face barriers to accessing Waddesdon Manor, Collection and Estate.



'The internship has been momentous. Last year, I was in a job I didn't enjoy. I knew I wanted to work in heritage, but I only had experience in Visitor Services and was struggling to secure a job in that field. The internship provided me with the skills and experience I needed to secure a job in conservation. My experience at Waddesdon has been invaluable. Without that year, I wouldn't be starting my new job as a Collections Assistant at Bletchley Park next week. In this role, I'll be working with collections and performing some tasks in the archive. Additionally, I have begun saving for a Master's degree, with the long-term goal of training to become a Conservator—all thanks to my internship at Waddesdon.'
